The Arts Foundation Futures Awards 2022 for Animation: Finalists Announced

The Arts Foundation announce the four finalists of The Arts Foundation Futures Awards (AFFA) 2022 for Animation, supported by The David Collins Foundation.

Savinder Bual, Sophie Koko Gate, Mary Stark and **Petra Szemán** have been selected from a long list of nominated artists as finalists for the £10,000 Arts Foundation Futures Award 2022 in Animation.

This new award explores expanded and experimental animation as art practice. Seeking out bold concepts and innovative uses of this diverse medium, the award supports creatives for whom animation is a key part of their artistic process and means of expression.

The AFFA 2022 Animation Judges are time-based media artist, Birgitta Hosea; Irish Director, Johnny Kelly; and artist, animator and curator, Edwin Rostron, who says:

"The four finalists' work demonstrates the great range and breadth of contemporary animation practice in the UK, and that the art form continues to exist in vibrant and exciting ways both on and beyond the screen. Animation is a way of thinking as much as it is a set of processes, and each of the four artists has pursued highly individual and original ways of thinking about animation."

Savinder Bual is fascinated by the mechanics and illusory qualities of cinema and early animation. She says, "We live in a time where physical things are disappearing. This has drawn me to juxtapose tangible everyday materials with the relative immateriality of video." Holding an MA in Photography from the RCA, when making her work, Savinder imagines herself to be a cinema pioneer from the 18th and 19th centuries. This period of engineering advancements and mechanical inventions was inextricably linked to new ways of seeing as a form of colonial control, from navigating the seas to the 24-hour clock replacing the sun as a marker of time. Savinder explores the interplay between the moving and the still, creating work that sits between the precinematic and the digital.

Sophie Koko Gate works in the 'untouched territory' that lies between experimental and mainstream animation. She sees her practice as a parallel existence that runs alongside ours, creating strangely familiar characters that live on behind the scenes, ageing and changing design with the films telling stories, evoking a feeling or simply to escape. Her film Half Wet (2015) explores ideas around ageing – specifically the loss of water or evaporation of one's self as we

near death. Sophie adds, 'I wish animation could give off scent. 'Half Wet' would be the smell of a hot country crossed with your ex-lovers deodorant'.

Rochdale based artist, **Mary Stark's** journey to complete her PhD in 2020 began while studying Embroidery at Manchester Metropolitan University. Her films today respond to the history of terminologies, techniques and apparatus from textile practice adopted by filmmaking in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century and the forgotten women who worked in the cutting rooms of early cinema. Her work For Delia (2016) responds to the archive of Delia Derbyshire, the pioneering figure in British electronic music behind the theme tune of Doctor Who. The 1400 foot 35mm film print translates her hand-drawn graphic scores into sprocket holes, splicing tape, fingerprints, dust specks, scribbles, scrawls, typewritten text, scraps of fabric, lace and thread, alluding to an absent female body.

Gateshead-based animator **Petra Szemán** is heavily influenced by the early filmography of Japanese director Makoto Shinkai, and watching the works of Hungarian experimental animators such as Marcell Jankovics while growing up in post-communist Hungary. In 2018-2020 they were awarded a MEXT Research Scholarship to fund two years of research and development in Tsukuba, Japan, where they began reworking the 'hero's journey' structure with the principles of the gaiden, a nonlinear narrative used in manga and anime that translates to mean '(out)side story'.

The Arts Foundation Futures Awards 2022 supports and celebrates artists for both their work to date and future development. The recipient of the £10,000 award for Animation will be announced along with awards in four other artforms (Materials Innovation, Music for Change, Theatre-Makers, and Visual Arts) at a celebration event in late January 2022 - with all finalists receiving £1,000 awards towards their artistic practice.

Iain Watson, Chief Executive Officer, David Collins Studio, and Trustee of The David Collins Foundation added:

"I am delighted that The David Collins Foundation has been given the opportunity to support The Arts Foundation Futures Awards 2022 for Animation. David supported artists across all mediums throughout his life, both professionally, through site-specific commissions and collaborations for David Collins Studio's projects, and in his personal life, as the collection at his home, made clear. He loved working with artists and always found the creative interchange of ideas hugely inspiring and rewarding. The Animation artists show such artistic ingenuity, and we look forward to supporting their creative journey at a timely moment in their career."
