The Arts Foundation Futures Awards 2022 Announce Online Award Ceremony and special guest, Artist, Jeremy Deller

The Arts Foundation will announce the five recipients of The Arts Foundation Futures Awards £10,000 Fellowship at an online presentation on **26 January 2022, 7 PM.**

Established in 1993, the prestigious annual Arts Foundation Futures Awards have become known as a marker for future artistic leaders across wide-ranging art forms. The special award presentation will share the extraordinary and varied work of all twenty finalists, selected by expert judging panels, from a long list of nominated artists from across the UK.

This years' categories are; Animation, Materials Innovation, Music for Change, Theatre-Makers and Visual Arts, with all finalists receiving £1,000 towards their artistic practice.

With a special welcome address from Guest of Honour, Artist, **Jeremy Deller -** the winners of the Arts Foundation Futures Awards £10,000 Fellowships will be announced by judges: Visual Artist, **Oreet Ashery**; Time-based Media Artist **Birgitta Hosea**; Folk Singer, Conservationist, and AF Fellow **Sam Lee**; UCL Professor of Materials & Society and TV and Radio presenter, **Mark Miodownik**; and Artistic Director and CEO of New Art Exchange, **Saad Eddine Said** at a celebratory online presentation on:

The Arts Foundation Futures Awards (AFFA) gives out five £10,000 fellowships every year, with all finalists each receiving £1,000. These are awarded based on past work and enable future development. Each year the awards focus on both broad and innovative art forms, across Craft, Design, Film, Literature, Material Innovation, Music, New Media, Performing and Visual Arts, and aim to highlight lesser-known areas of creative practice and also include emerging multidisciplinary artists.

The contribution of the Arts Foundation Futures Awards to the Arts in the UK is demonstrated by its past Fellows, many of whom have become leaders in their respective art forms, including Wayne McGregor (1994), Alice Oswald (1996), Sarah Kane (1998), Asif Kapadia (2001), Ali Smith (2001), Rufus Norris (2002), Lynette Yiadom-Boakye (2006), and more recently, Simon Fujiwara (2009) Hollie McNish (2015), Evan Ifekoya (2017), Holly Hendry (2019), and Bethany Williams (2020).
